Minister's Corner

Pausing for Wisdom

Here's a recent column by Rev. Shari Woodbury, Minister of First Unitarian Church of Omaha, that expresses many of the things I've been thinking recently:



"We made it to our final dinner with out-of-town relatives before one of my in-laws went off on a political tangent. My heart began to race. I glanced around the table. It was clear that no one else was going to engage. I was tempted to just put another forkful of spaghetti in my mouth and wait for someone to change the subject.

"But I don't believe that checking out is the solution. Nor did I want to go on attack mode. Whether a conflict occurs in my family, my church, or my country, I believe I will be most effective if I can choose a different path than the aggrieved one that was being trod by my relative.

"I noticed the agitation welling up in me. My thinking was suddenly clouded; my jaw clenched; my foot tapped. I took a deep breath and resolved not to make harsh assumptions about this relative - but not to remain silent either. My child was at that dinner table, listening. How could I model another way?

"Buddhist teacher Pema Chödrön invites us to "not bite the hook." Can you see the fish in the stream, startled by the dangerous gleaming hook that has just appeared, ready to attack? But the angry fish who bites the hook will only hurt itself.

"Chödrön describes four R's for transforming this urge to bite the hook: 1) recognizing what is going on in us; 2) refraining from embracing those feelings; 3) relaxing with the underlying urge to react; and 4) "resolving to interrupt the momentum like this for the rest of our lives."

"For myself, I'll add a fifth R: rechanneling that energy to other, better uses. That's the reward I get for putting space around my instinctive response: I get to choose how to use the energy that would have been expended thrashing on the hook, so that it might instead be spent well.

"I did my best to open a dialogue, sharing my perspective with my kinsperson. While my ranting

Because I had paused before speaking up, my words carried a bit more wisdom, a bit less reactivity.

"So here's my prayer for today: Spirit of Life, help me to notice when I am hooked - or better yet, to notice the hook coming, and to take pause. Thus may my wisdom grow stronger, my energy better channeled. Let my example be worthy of emulation by young people, so that in the family, the community, and the nation, we learn to engage conflict constructively. So may it be, and amen."

Laurel Civic Association - Hand Up Program Update

UUCOV undertook a four-month fund raising initiative in the spring and summer of 2020 and was proud to donate over \$20,000 to the Laurel Civic Association Hand Up Program. The Hand UP Program was designed to provide financial education and resources to people economically distressed and who are underserved by the banking industry. In early August 2020, Khleber Van Zandt, Pam Palmer and Rosemary Hagan, representing the congregation, presented the check to Michael Fluker, Executive Director of Laurel Civic Association (LCA).



August also saw LCA awarded Business of the Year Award - Not for Profit by the Venice Chamber of Commerce for their work in Sarasota County.

In October LCA was awarded a \$30,000 grant from the Bank of America Charitable Foundation for the Hand Up Program. Our initial donation to express community support for the new program was instrumental in this award from Bank of America.

Throughout the fall LCA worked to enter into a contractual agreement with the Manatee Community Federal Credit Union (MCFCU) who has changed its name to Financial Access Federal Credit Union. This name change reinforces their commitment to expand their services beyond Manatee County. Those negotiations have been completed and a working agreement established. The \$50,000 raised for this program will underwrite \$500,000 worth of credit.

LCA has also found support for the Hand Up Program from Capital Good Fund which is a non-profit social change program out of Rhode Island that targets its work with citizens struggling with poor credit ratings. They work in many states including Florida with the same goals as the Hand Up Program.

Covid restrictions and the increased community needs due to Covid delayed the initial implementation date for the new Hand Up Program. However, LCA has identified a lead staff member for this program and hired an assistant with Spanish language to increase its outreach to Spanish speaking families. A curriculum for Hand Up classes has been developed as well as a program concept. A brochure has been developed and printed to present the program to the public. A copy of the brochure is available through the following link https://uucov.org/images/phocadownload/Hand%20Up%2012.10.pdf and will be available in print to the congregation on the lanai once we return to our buildings.

March continues to find LCA limited in its face-to-face contacts with clients and, at the same time, very much involved in crisis response to families struggling with loss of jobs due to Covid, adult children returning home due to loss of job and school age children struggling with on-line schooling. The pandemic and the issues that it has inflicted on Laurel families has delayed the start of the Hand Up Program. However, several families/individuals have been identified through crisis management services for referral to the Hand Up Program. Thus, client identification has begun.

The donated monies from all sources have yet to be taped but will be in the coming months as the program launches. In the meantime, Laurel has applied for a grant to provide ten new laptops for the Hand Up Program to allow the classes to be held in local libraries or other places that will be convenient to the clients served. As the Hand Up Program launches UUCOV members will be kept up to date.

Laurel Civic Association has been selected as an organization eligible for matching funds from the Louis & Gloria Flanzer Philanthropic Trust for 2021. If anyone is interested in donating to LCA you may wish to donate through this trust and earmark your donation for LCA. The contact for the Trust is www.Flanzertrust.org. You are given the opportunity to designate LCA as recipient of your donation and you may further designate the Hand Up program.

How very fortunate this congregation is to have the opportunity to help start this program and help it grow. We look forward to seeing this program become reality for our neighbors.

Meet Our Congregants

This column is to introduce both new and not so new members, friends and visitors to each other. During this pandemic when we can't be together it just seemed like a good idea to introduce each other to each other.

Kindra Muntz - One of 39 charter members of UUCOV, Kindra served on the public relations committee, site committee, membership committee, choir, social justice



committees, and the board. She met John Meneilley at the second UUCOV service in November 1998. They lived together from 2000 until 2006, when a major heart event left him paralyzed from the waist down and led to his death in 2007.

Kindra was born in Chicago, attended high school in Delmar, New York, and college at Radcliffe/Harvard. After working in publishing and medical research, she spent 18 years in management at GE Aircraft Engine Division in Lynn, Massachusetts and 5 years at Merrill Lynch before retiring to Venice in 1997 while caring for her mother.

A lifelong UU, Kindra loves that ours is a faith "with a spiritual center and a civic circumference." By publicizing UUCOV in our early years, starting UUCOV bio books and connecting with UUs on the Gulf Coast, she helped UUCOV grow. Expanding our UU connections, she became president of the Southwest Cluster of UU churches, member of the Florida District board, and finally president of UU Justice Florida, our statewide justice action network. She drafted a four-year Congregational Study Action Issue (CSAI) entitled "The Corruption of Our Democracy" which our UUCOV board proposed to the UUA in 2016, was adopted at General Assembly in Columbus and ran in UU congregations nationwide until 2020.

Kindra formed the Sarasota Alliance for Fair Elections in January 2006 and led a petition drive for paper ballots that passed countywide and was implemented statewide in 2007. For that, she won the Jim Barrett Social Justice Award of the Florida District UUA in 2007, and the Nelson Poynter Award of the ACLU in 2008. After leading a petition drive in 2018 for single member districts for electing County Commissioners, she won the Control Growth Now Award in 2019 and the Thomas Payne Award from Florida Veterans for Common Sense in 2020. In 2021 she was just thrilled to make phone calls with UU the Vote on January 3rd with 186 UUs from 27 states, to help voters in Georgia learn how to get to the polls.

Her hope is that UUCOV will continue to engage in the good work of the UUA, UU Justice Florida and UU affiliates, as we keep doing charitable work locally.

Ken and Ruth Boysworth - Ruth is from DC via Washington State and Ken is from Virginia. When Ken came home to Virginia from Vietnam we got married (1968) and traveled from southern California to Oregon, working our way up the coast. Marc, our only child, was born in Oregon. Shortly after that we moved back to DC. I went to nursing school for two years.



We stayed in the same house for 30 years- I got a BS in nursing and worked in the same ICU all that time. Ken managed Facilities

Maintenance Contracts in many of the iconic office buildings in DC, Virginia, Maryland and federal courthouses in Georgia & Florida.

We moved to Venice 5 years ago and immediately joined UUCOV for a place to meet likeminded people. We dislike being so far from our son and DIL and two teenage grandgirls but love the warmth, free beaches, Black Gold and lack of snow. At UUCoV Ken is on the Board of Trustees and I manage the coffee time and the Waters Hall Library and help with the Family Promise & Book Group.



In a climate of joy, goodwill and trust this congregation covenants

- to treat one another with kindness and respect,
- to listen with openness and acceptance,
- to support and protect the environment of which we are all a part,
- to solve problems responsibly as we grow and change,
- to encourage learning and nurture the growth of diverse human spirits, and
- to dedicate time, talent and resources in an effort to make a difference in local and world communities.

In the spirit of our free religious heritage, we promise these to one another.

UU Principles

We, the member congregations of the Unitarian Universalist Association, covenant to affirm and promote:

- The inherent worth and dignity of every person;
- Justice, equity and compassion in human relations;
- Acceptance of one another and encouragement to spiritual growth in our congregations;
- A free and responsible search for truth and meaning;
- The right of conscience and the use of the democratic process within our congregations and in society at large;
- The goal of world community with peace, liberty, and justice for all;
- Respect for the interdependent web of all existence of which we are a part.

UU Sources

The Living Tradition we share draws from many sources:

- Direct experience of that transcending mystery and wonder, affirmed in all cultures, which moves us to a renewal of spirit and an openness to the forces that create and uphold life;
- Words and deeds of prophetic women and men which challenge us to confront powers and structures of evil with justice, compassion, and the transforming power of love;
- Wisdom from the world's religions which inspires us in our ethical and spiritual life;
- Jewish and Christian teachings which call us to respond to God's love by loving our neighbors as ourselves;
- Humanist teachings which counsel us to heed the guidance of reason and the results of science, and warn us against idolatries of the mind and spirit.
- Spiritual teachings of Earth-centered traditions which celebrate the sacred circle of life and instruct us to live in harmony with the rhythms of nature.

Grateful for the religious pluralism which enriches and ennobles our faith, we are inspired to deepen our understanding and expand our vision. As free congregations we enter into this covenant, promising to one another our mutual trust and support.
