
UUCOV COVID-19 Task Force



Our group is continuing to meet via zoom on a monthly basis, focusing on reviewing current information from UUA, the CDC, the Florida Department of Health, and various other sources. Our guiding principle continues to be on staying informed and working to ensure that our UUCOV congregation remain connected while being cautious and diligent in maintaining the safety of our staff, our congregation, and our community.

Our recommendation to the Board is to continue holding video Sunday services and meeting via ZOOM at this time with no firm scheduled date for resuming in person services and meetings onsite. We believe following the guidance of science along with our UU values is the responsible way for us to continue operating.

UUCOV/Laurel Civic Association Empowerment Program Update (Hand Up Initiative)



UUCOV is proud to announce that we succeeded in meeting our goal to provide seed money for the Laurel Civic Association (LCA) to fund the Hand Up initiative (formerly called LCA Empowerment), an empowerment banking program with the Manatee Credit Union. Donations from our members and friends made this happen.

Our neighbors in the Laurel area of town are economically challenged and have been systematically denied access to resources that we take for granted. Many UUCOV members have volunteered at the Association with their after-school program or helped sort food at their food drive. So, we know LCA.

The Hand Up initiative will underwrite the beginning of this program so Manatee Credit Union can bring banking services to our neighbors. They want to provide access to banking services that you and I take for granted – bank loans, credit cards, checking accounts and even check cashing services. There will also be an education program to help families learn banking skills. Michael Fluker, Executive Director of LCA, and his board calls this empowerment.

We expect to be able to say our congregation started a program that made a significant difference in people's lives and we responded with a yes, when asked to help. We hope that this program improves the lives of people of color in our community and we hope that you feel a great sense of pride that you made this happen.

We have been promised some stories and some data as this program comes alive, so

stay tuned as we hear about what we have helped make possible. We do hope this is just the beginning of some increased dialogue with LCA on how we can make a difference.



Life and Music in the Times of Covid

Even though I haven't seen your faces in months you have been in my mind in every recording I've made. Instead of seeing you and the choir in person, I have been embedded in my music studio at home. There I've spent hours researching copyright law, how to get the best recordings while dodging the noise of lawnmowers and trash trucks and searching for musical moments that might enrich each service. Oh, yes... and practicing, because recordings capture every flaw forever. If learning things keeps you young, I should be at least 10 years younger by now!

Life and music are grounded in similar lessons. Both are filled with challenges, transitions, and questions, like it or not! And Covid has challenged us in so many ways. As much as you may prepare, there are still moments out of your control. The words of Louis Pasteur come to mind – "Chance favors the prepared mind". So, I prepare.



Pasteur's and Rilke's advice go hand in hand, asking me not to struggle with the unknown, but live the moment, working and preparing in the moment, and trusting that when I am sufficiently prepared, the answers will become clear. Many thanks to Dennis for being open to this emergent process. With Khleber's return, we will not transition back, because nothing will be the way it was. We begin to prepare, awaiting the time when the vision will become clear.

The choir has experienced the emergent process in our rehearsals. When set in an open and prepared mind, listening to and allowing the moment to unfold can open the door to wonderful moments and insights. But chance brings with it a loss of control, where trust is imperative.

The loss of Ray Goins just before Covid had a huge impact on the choir and this loss was quickly followed by the cancellation of Music Sunday just 10 days before the service. The choir put in so much work and never got to see it to its conclusion. Thankfully, prior to Covid, we were able to gather at my house for a wonderful time of community and amazing food.

So, as I step back for a while, I will strive to be patient. Live the questions. Live everything. Prepare and trust the emergent process, trusting that when the time is right the answers will become clear. Maybe you will give it a try!

I had about 15 short stories published online and recently had a novel published by a small house. Carol and I found UUCOV early in our snowbird years and have been forever grateful that we did. It is our oasis of liberal thinking here in conservative Florida and our main source of like-minded friends.

Carol Wolfers - I also was born and grew up in Buffalo, NY., in fact just a few blocks away from where Bill lived. My greatest joy was and is my children. Jeff, who we lost to cancer in 2018, which was a devastating experience for us. He went to college and worked his way up to become VP of the bank, HSBC at the home office in London, in 1999. He had been promoted and moved to the UK with his wife and 2 daughters. The girls finished their schooling there and have both married and given us great-grandchildren, two Brits and one Welsh.

Our daughter Meg became a computer programmer, got disillusioned with the corporate world and re-trained to become a high school math teacher, now recently retired. Our youngest, Tim, went off in a different direction and has a very successful business driving his van to lovely estates in the Phil. area where he and his wife groom pets. Their son Sawyer recently graduated from college and is now a golf pro.

Christina "Tina" Putney - I've been drawn to UU from my 20s. After Al and I married (38 years ago), he and I joined the UU Congregation of Flint Michigan. Five years ago, we began spending winters in Venice and attending UUCOV.






