December 13, 2020: Video Online Service: The Gift





So what are we doing for fun these days?

Well, on the morning of November 19th, a dozen church leaders assembled at the sanctuary for a "trial service" designed to test the safety and effectiveness of the systems we will use when we begin meeting again for Sunday services someday.

This is the first "pseudo-live service" we've done together since March. So how did it go?

We did it. We got through it. It went. But not particularly well, and not without a few stumbles, a few breakdowns, and a few glaring glitches.

Hey, we haven't done this since March, so we ought to expect some rustiness.

Here's a sample of some of the problems we encountered:

Traffic noise. We opened the glass doors all around the Sanctuary to allow maximum exchange of air and keep each of us as safe as possible. Surprise, surprise, though: garbage trucks, diesel pickups, and tricked-out motorcycles make a lot of racket, and the open doors make it difficult to hear.

wafting through open sanctuary doors can be delightful. But they can also blow sheet music off the piano and manuscripts off the pulpit, they can be loud blowing through the trees, and they can make it feel a little too cool in the pews for some people.

Safety. A few people said it felt too soon to be in a partially enclosed space with others. And as socially distanced as we were, it's hard to shake the thought that gathering with others is exactly how the virus spreads.

On the other hand, there's no denying that sitting in the Sanctuary again, being there with fellow members of your congregation, is exactly the kind of fun many, many of us are craving right about now.

It is not time to re-open. Infection statistics are too high, we care too much about each other, and it is not yet "safe enough" to warrant taking the inherent risks.

But make no mistake: we're closer than we've been to being able to reopen when the time comes. And we will continue building the capacity to safely provide all the services we can to those who need them the most.

We do ask that all posts be respectful, as these are not created to replace face to face dialogue but rather to provide a vehicle for sharing of information on a timely basis.



Reflections from Centenarians

UUCOV members who are centenarians have been invited to share with their congregation their lives over the last century. This is a gift to their congregation.

Grace Grote – Born in Cincinnati, Ohio in the winter of 1920. Was five years old when I memorized a poem called, "The Gingham Dog and the Calico Cat" and recited it loudly whenever asked and even when not asked.

My parents were middle-aged, my sister and brother in their teens. They all, including my good Aunt Annie, nurtured me with books, music, dancing and elocution lessons, trips to the zoo and up the Ohio River on a big paddle-wheel boat. With it all, I was acting and writing plays.

Fast forward: Teaching degree from the University of Cincinnati and a year later Broadway bound. I'd had several

years studying acting with the Cincinnati Actors Guild, and so I fully expected to meet hard times. Eight years: scratch-and-starve, broken by deeply satisfying work on the road and in stock.

One summer I was hired to direct plays at a children's camp. The man in charge was not happy to see an unexpected woman. However, it worked out: we were married nineteen years. Donald was a scieence teacher and artist. Through him, I was hired by the Stratemeyer Syndicate, producers of the Hardy Boys, Nancy Drew and many series books. I was Pen-of-all-work -- story-making, editing, traveling for research. Eventually I ghost wrote The Bobbsey Twins.



After I was widowed, I moved to Venice, Florida where I wrote a column for the Sarasota Herald Tribune called, "Old Lady at Large." Well, the column is gone but the old lady is still at large in her memories.

I am grateful for all the joys, traveling with my husband, my work and the kind friends who warm my life.

Especially our UU's. They bring guidance, help, fun – real support. Thank you for all we have done together and your patience listening.


