## **Exploring Possibilities**

I don't usually get excited about numbers, but beginning to use "2021" feels really good. In years past, it has taken me a



while to get used to writing the new year instead of the old one,

but this year I'm so glad to see 2020 in the rearview mirror that I predict it's not going to be a problem at all.

Of course, as glad as I am to see the old year go, I know we will live with its consequences for a long time.

Yes, there will continue to be plenty of political and social and cultural fallout from 2020, and we'll do our best with all that. But right now I'm thinking closer to home and about how we might better maintain connections within our congregation.

We've done pretty well under the circumstances, I guess: several Fellowship Groups have continued to meet on Zoom throughout the pandemic, as have a few Adult RE programs. And the children have had a YRE class every Sunday, too.

We've continued to post recorded worship services on our website and on YouTube each Sunday. There's even one for Christmas Eve, a reprise of a service from a couple of years ago featuring Grace Grote and Lori Baribeault.

And there's been the weekly Sunday morning Zoom Coffee Hour that has allowed a couple of dozen people to see each other and chat for a few minutes every week.

But when you look at the numbers, it is clear that few of our members and friends take advantage of any of these online opportunities. And so I wonder: what else can we do to promote and maintain important connections across the distances that COVID-19 has imposed on us?

One idea I would like to try is a modified "Chalice Circle"

## **Reflections from Centenarians**

UUCOV members who are centenarians have been invited to share with their congregation their lives over the last cent

My name is James G, (Jack) Smith, born in Racine, WI on Aug 3, 1919 to catholic parents. I attended catholic grade sc public system, graduating in 1936 from high school at age 16. I worked for two years to save money and then in 1938 e Mechanical Engineering student. It was there as a freshman that I met and, before my senior year, in 1941, married Jos years we had three children, Jerry in 1944, Judy in 1947 and Jay in 1953.

Life changed immeasurably with Pearl Harbor and WWII. Companies were in dire need of engineers. I was interviewed graduation by the Wright Aeronautical Corp. so that, upon graduation, Jo and I went directly to New Jersey to begin wo ignition section in charge of a small ignition lab. When planes with new, out of the box, replacement engines began cutt falling into the sea in front of the carrier, I was one of three to determine why and eliminate the cause. Which we did.

After the war I joined the DuPont Co. in Wilmington, DE at the Engineering Development Laboratory (an engineer's dre to work on problems, of which there were many, from all operating departments. We mainly got the ones the department knack for innovative thinking and as a result I was awarded ten patents for my efforts. When I decided to retire after 27 consultant which I did for another 10 years retiring finally in 1982.

We moved to FL in 1985 and to North Port in 2003. Jo died in Nov. 2004 and I joined UU in 2005 largely at Judy's urgin been together since 2006.

I have seen change in almost every aspect of life – Communication is a good example. Radio was in its infancy, TV was or a cumbersome plugged-in phone, many without a private line. Transportation is another example. When my father be had to drive across town to have the bumpers installed. At that time public transportation was streetcar, bus or train. Lin planes had propellors.


