Sunday Services

July 5, 2020: Video Online Service: When Democracy Stumbles

The theme Rev. Dennis McCarty has chosen for the month of July is "Religious Witness." As part of this theme, he intends to preach from the Sanctuary floor this month, rather than from the pulpit, to witness for several of his colleagues who would be unable to reach our pulpit to preach from it.

Rev. Dennis McCarty will mark the 4th of July Weekend with "When Democracy Stumbles." According to polls, two-thirds of Americans think our democracy is headed the wrong way. But this is nothing new, democracy does sometimes lose its way. Rev. Dennis' own father was caught up, "blacklisted" during in the infamous "witch hunts" of the 1950's. Rev. Dennis will re-examine that era and the rise and fall of notorious Senator Joseph McCarthy, for whom "McCarthyism" is named, and seek insights for our time.

July 12, 2020: Video Online Service: What Does One for All and All for One Even Mean?

Rev. Dennis McCarty. In his final regular Sunday service, Rev. Dennis will ponder a question which has haunted him since last winter. He finds UUCOV to be a lovely, warm congregation, with many wonderful people and significant strengths. Yet are we as good as we think we are? Are we as "welcoming" as we believe we are? Rev. Dennis will deliver this month's services from the Sanctuary floor, rather than the pulpit, as an "act of religious witness" for colleagues for whom the pulpit is inaccessible. "What Does One for All and All for One even Mean?" if we pick and choose those to whom it applies?

July 19, 2020: Video Online Service: Hello Goodbye Again

Rev. Dennis McCarty & Rev. Khleber Van Zandt. This will be Rev. McCarty's last Sunday with us as Sabbatical Minister, and Rev. Van Zandt's first after being away for 5½ months. Has anything important happened these past few months?

July 26, 2020: Video Online Service: Our Broken Contract

Rev. Khleber Van Zandt. More than 400 years after the first African slaves were brought to these shores, the social contract that is the American Experiment remains broken for far too many of us.

Family Promise of South Sarasota County's Open-Door Program offers families with children facing homelessness a chance to get back on their feet. Minister's Corner

Notes From Your Sabbatical Minister



As my time with you grows short, I find myself reflecting on what a "trip" it has been. Not so very "long," of course, but certainly "strange," to steal a Grateful Dead lyric.

Interviewing with your Sabbatical Team almost a year ago, I told

them I felt "ready for a new adventure." I didn't dream it would consist largely of electronic communication, camcorded services, and hiding from the coronavirus.

That's the way life is, though. Back in Divinity School, Meadville Lombard Theological School's campus was about a block from the University of Chicago. I enjoyed visiting the museum at the University's Oriental Institute, but alas, they were doing renovations in one wing, so I could only look at about half the exhibits.

One that really fascinated me, crated up so that I could only see a few inches of cuneiform writing on the back, was a 40-ton lamassu, a huge statue of a winged bull with a human head and crown.

Then I walked in one day, glanced down the hall, and there it was, uncrated, standing there in all its glory surrounded by people in white lab coats. Excited, I asked one of them if they were finally putting it back on display.

"No," he replied. "We're from the engineering school. We needed a large object to calibrate our laser on, and we got permission to use that statue."

To me, that was a real "aha" moment. That's the nature of our existence. When the King of Assyria commissioned that statue nearly 3,000 years ago, neither he nor his priests, in their wildest dreams, could have guessed it would someday be used to calibrate a laser on a continent none of them even knew existed.

Scientists have been predicting a pandemic for decades. But I never would have guessed I'd be your minister during one. It has been worrying and frustrating at times, struggling with new ways of doing things. But it has also been deeply rewarding. Best of all, I've gotten to know some really fine people, hopefully made some lasting friendships.

A Year of 'Firsts'

This month, July, our congregation has yet another first. We survived our first sabbatical!! And did very well.

We say good-bye and a sincere thank you to our first Sabbatical Minister, Rev. Dennis McCarty. A thank you, also, to the Sabbatical Planning Committee who has worked with Rev. Dennis through these months to help ensure success. The Committee is Jack Head, Dick Smith, Dale Povenmire, and Marsha French.

On Sunday, July 19th during the Sunday service Rev. Dennis will return the pulpit to the congregation and the congregation will in turn return it to Rev. Khleber. We welcome back our Called Minister, Rev. Khleber Van Zandt.

We wish Rev. Dennis success and good health in the future and we hope to see him back as a guest minister. He led us through another first for this year - a pandemic.

Treasurers Report

COVID-19 has had devastating effects on plans and programs at UUCOV and subsequently our budget as approved in March 2020. Your Finance Committee started re-examining our budget in late April when we realized our income from renting the sanctuary, the travel group and fundraising activities including the auction could not be planned on. Also, pledges are \$29,000 under the budgeted amount. This loss to budget amounted to \$56,000.



So, we went to work on expenses. First, we reduced the lawn mowing to every other week; a \$5,000 reduction. The Campus Crew has changed their focus to only maintenance with no projects. This is a \$6,000 reduction. Most recently we have adopted a policy of no guest ministers and no guest musicians thus saving \$8,000. Team budgets and other budget items were reduced from 50-75%.

This is a very aggressive budget which currently projects a small loss for the year. In spite of these cuts, we have maintained our pay for all of our staff. Your Board of Trustees approved this new budget, aptly titled "COVID-19 Budget" on June 19. With everyone's support we can financially survive this fiscal year. I will keep you advised throughout the year.

Our recommendation to the Board is to continue holding video Sunday services and meeting via ZOOM at this time with no firm scheduled date for resuming in person services and meetings onsite. We believe following the guidance of science along with our UU values is the responsible way for us to continue operating.

UUCOV/Laurel Civic Association Empowerment Program Update

Dear Members & Friends,

In these troubling times many of us who are part of the UUCOV family are asking, "what can I do to help those in our own community who are Black, Hispanic, or who are marginalized in some way by us or by our society?"

The Laurel Community Association (LCA) has identified a pressing need and a tangible way we as a congregation can assist many of the folks they work with by financially supporting them in establishing a program providing access to banking services. The total "price tag" for this program is \$20,000 and as of June 21, UUCOV has received a little over two-thirds the amount LCA requires to undertake this new venture. The goal is to reach the full \$20,000 amount by the end of July to get the project going in the not too

distant future.

Many of us are hoping that this can truly be a fully funded UUCOV project but in order to do that, your help is needed. Would you please consider making a taxdeductible donation to assist us in reaching this goal? Your checks should be made out to and mailed to UUCOV with 'LCA' noted on the memo line.



How to be a genuine and not fake ally

Those of us white, straight, privileged people often think of ourselves as kind, loving people who despite our privilege are doing good things for "others". But are we?? How do we know that our intentions are actually connecting for the purpose we intend?

Whether we intend to support women, citizens with disabilities, persons of color, citizens who identify as LGBTQ or another group, are we actually helping? Being an effective ally takes some self-awareness.

Here are ten points to strive for as you work to be an ally to whatever group of people you choose –



• Shut up and listen. This isn't about you.

• Ally isn't a noun. Think of it as a present verb!! Not what you did yesterday or what you might do tomorrow, but what are you doing at this moment?

• Ally isn't a self-proclaimed identity. It is a choice whether "others" trust us to call us an ally.

• Allies don't take breaks.

• Allies need to learn constantly. You don't just understand and stop being open to learn more.

• You can't be an ally in isolation. You need to be in active dialogue with the "others" you wish to work with. You need to be part of the group.

• Allies don't need or seek the spotlight. You are a minor player not the leader.

• The most important thing an ally can do is to engage those who share your identity to think and act differently.

• This is tough and you will make mistakes. Listen, apologize, and learn from your mistake.

• This is not easy work, but do not take the energy from those you are attempting to support. This isn't about you.

Justice Action

This month is all about voting.

All registered Sarasota County voters are encouraged to vote in the August 18 Primary, even if you are "up north". Just make sure you have notified the Supervisor of Elections (at 941-861-8618) of your northern address, because Vote by Mail ballots are not forwarded!



Remember, it's not a Primary election for School Board candidates: it's their final election!

The School Board races are non-partisan, and countywide, so Independents and voters

with No Party Affiliation as well as Sarasota County voters of all political parties can vote in those elections, for candidates in both School Board Districts 2 and 3.

For other important information on the candidates, please email kindramuntz@verizon.net. These School Board elections are two of the critical ones this year at the local level. Public education is at risk. As Christina Greer, Associate Professor of Political Science at Fordham University said, "It is the down-ballot races that determine much of what happens."

The League of Women Voters of Sarasota County will hold a Zoom forum for School Board candidates on August 3 at 5:30 PM. Registration for the forum can be made at the web site www.lwvsrq.org beginning June 29.
