# How to Contact Us

# Which Way Do We Go?

I've been mulling some past history:

On March 8th, 2020, we held our last in-person Sunday service (a total of 22 COVID deaths had occurred in the U.S.).

On April 1st, the Board of Trustees decided to officially close the campus (deaths totaled 3,170 in the U.S. to that point).

In May, I 'partially returned' early from sabbatical to help Rev. Dennis McCarty with some pastoral tasks (George Floyd was murdered by police in Minneapolis on May 25th)

On July 19th, Rev. Dennis ended his term as Sabbatical Minister as I officially returned from sabbatical (the U.S. had just recorded a world-record single-day rise of new cases, with 77,638 new infections reported on the 17th).

In early September, Dick Smith and I determined that we should begin working toward live-streaming rather than recording our services (on September 1st, the U.S passed the 6-million mark of reported COVID cases).

On December 24th, we posted a recorded Christmas Eve service featuring Grace Grote and the late Lori Baribeault, and hosted an online Christmas Party on Zoom (on January 1st, the U.S passed the 20-million-case milestone).

On February 7th, Dick Smith, Thom Reeves, and I successfully live-streamed the first service held on a Sunday morning since the previous March (by that morning, COVID deaths in the U.S. totaled 445,000).

As I write a sermon for February 21st and prepare this column for the March 2021 newsletter, I read that the total reported cases of COVID in the U.S. are approaching 28 million, with the total number of deaths near 500,000.

The counselor side of me might ask, "And how does that make you feel?" Of course having lived through the history I've just recited, I'm going to be emotional. Wouldn't anyone be?

There are positive signs, though: more and more of us are finding ways to get a vaccination. New-case numbers have turned down in the past few weeks as has the number of deaths as well as the occupancy levels of local ICUs. So there's that.

# Special Offerings Proposal 2021 - 2022

At the upcoming annual meeting, members will be asked to vote on Special Offerings for the following year. The Social Justice Team has voted to keep the three charitable organizations presently receiving Special Offerings from the congregation and to add two new ones. The five charities are:



<u>All Faiths Food Bank</u> - The economic impact of COVID-19 has increased food insecurity in our community. Business closures have affected lower-income families and people with hourly wages in particular. For every \$1 given the food bank can purchase 5 meals.

<u>CHAPS (Charlotte HIV/AIDS People Support)</u> - is a 501(c)3, all volunteer agency that provides supplemental food and hygiene products at no cost to persons in need living with HIV/AIDS and their dependents in North Port, Venice, Englewood, Nokomis and Laurel. Hygiene products cannot be purchased with food stamps, and they can be vital to a person with a compromised immune system. All monetary donations from UUCOV are directed to purchases for clients residing in South Sarasota County.

<u>Family Promise of South Sarasota County's Open-Door Program</u> - gives families with children that are facing homelessness a chance to get back on their feet. They do this by helping with rent payment if the family falls behind, or by helping pay 1st, last, and security deposit on a rental home, or by paying for 1-3 days of emergency shelter in a motel while housing is being secured.

Good Samaritan Pharmacy & Health Services - provides medical services to uninsured, financially needy members of our community. Over 30% of Sarasota families have income below 200% of the poverty line and can be devastated by one medical crisis. Good Samaritan Pharmacy & Health Services provides free access to prescription and over-the-counter medications as well as access to physician services, including diagnostic testing. Even during this pandemic, they continue to provide prescription medication and virtual doctor visits to both new and preexisting patients. They are a 501(c)(3) located in Nokomis, staffed almost entirely by volunteers. Our donations would be used to purchase medications.

RIP Medical Debt - is a 501(c)3 non-profit organization founded in 2014 to raise money to be used to erase medical debt for poor individuals who earn less than two times the federal poverty level. So far it has raised enough to wipe out \$1.5 billion in debt for over 650,000 individuals. It purchases bundled debt portfolios at the rate of \$1-to-\$100 (so that every \$1 donated erases \$100 in debt.) UUCOV would join an ongoing campaign by Florida Humanists to help the campaign achieve its \$20,000 goal (thereby erasing \$2,000,000 in debt). The first goal is to wipe out debt in Charlotte, Collier (where Immokalee farmworkers live), and DeSoto Counties in Florida. To date \$19,150 has been raised. Any additional funds will be allocated to communities most in need in the state of Florida.
