LCA Empowerment Program - Hand Up Initiative

On August 24th, Khleber Van Zandt, minister, Pam MacFarlane, President, Board of Trustees, and Rosemary Hagan pr Director of Laurel Civic Association, the \$20,320 donation check to provide the initial start-up funding for a banking emp in the Laurel community. Hand Up will be initiated in early October through a partnership with the Manatee Credit Union, a CDFI banking institution. The joint program with the credit union and LCA will bring banking education and access to checking accounts, automatic deposits of work and retirement checks, check cashing, saving accounts, credit cards and loans.

This drive, accomplished during the COVID closure of our buildings, is a significant accomplishment for this congregation. Congratulations on making a significant impact in people's lives. This exemplifies our congregation's mission and our principles. Stay tuned for updates as this program evolves. I was thrilled to be able to make Get-Out-The-Vote phone calls with a local political party for August 18th in Sarasota County, and to encourage other UUCOV members and friends to using the automated online system called Mobilize was fast and easy. Once it was set up or minutes with personalized help), it worked like a charm. Because I knew how important the committed to calling as many hours as I could in the last critical days on Monday August 1 PM on Election Day. I used a system called "the 20/20 Stretch": call for 20 minutes, stretch 20 seconds, then call again for 20 minutes. I kept a hash-tag record of my calls during eac

calls in 20 minutes, leaving many messages using the short script provided, although I made many fewer calls when I re to talk with them briefly, help when needed, and motivate them to vote.

It was eye-opening to realize how many people need just a little extra help to encourage them to vote, because they ne process. Many people are

consumed with concerns about their health, their jobs, their families. Voting is not a priority for them, although we know their votes can

make for their lives. I am struck by the fact that we can help each other, teach each other, and show compassion for all When you think about it,

that is a very UU thing to do! ("Support the inherent worth and dignity of every person" and "...the use of the democratic really enjoyed helping voters understand what they could do, and how to be able to vote, when they were in doubt. The people from North Port to Newtown made me realize they are all our neighbors. We all are connected. Community Outreach

Backpack Kids continues to be on hiatus during the coronavirus pandemic.

Did you know -

- 8 million Floridians struggle with food insecurity, and 800,000 of those are children;
- 69% must choose between food and transportation;
- 51% eat food beyond the safe expiration date;
- 73% must choose between food and paying utilities; and
- 79% also purchase unhealthy, inexpensive food to fill the need gap.

The story told by these statistics hits close to home. New Hope Community Food Bank in North Port reports an increase 2500 monthly clients over last year's monthly average of 7500. In Sarasota, All Faiths Food Bank Chair, Nelle Miller, inc "hunger in our community has risen 120% in just the last few weeks."

Let's be clear. COVID-19 has caused a huge increase in food insecurity. And we are just beginning to experience the fa \$600 unemployment stimulus. Americans worry about negotiations with landlords, mortgage holders, utility companies, companies.
